In fact, Brutus and the conspirators succeed in dismembering the corporeal Caesar, but they fail to destroy his spirit. Antony invokes the spirit of Caesar first in his soliloquy in Act III, Scene 1, and he uses it to bring the citizens of Rome to rebellion in Act III, Scene 2. soliloquies. In the wee hours of the morning, he is alone on stage, debating with himself about what to do regarding Julius Caesar. On the one hand, he compares Caesar to an unhatched snake, asserting that Caesar is not dangerous yet but that he could become dangerous. Brutus also worries that, as Caesar climbs the ladder of power, he will forget all of the people beneath him and, thus, become a corrupted leader.
